<u>Camden</u>: General meeting and pot luck supper on July 31. Judith McKeon spoke on roses.

Our "home grown" plant sale will be held on September 11th.

On August 22, our Homeowner's Series will have "Extending the Growing Season".

Other subjects we have had were "Lawns, Bulbs, Vegetable Gardening, and Backyard Chickens". August 14 and 15 we have 25 seniors coming to Camden County to make succulent gardens.

<u>Cumberland</u>: Doug Fisher installed our new slate of officers at the June meeting at one of our MG's houses. It was also a going away party for our Coordinator. Interviews are going on for a new person. Hopefully, someone will arrive soon.

Revising the By-Laws. Helpline has been busy.

Horticulture Therapy will be continuing at the Veteran's Home every other week. 8 MG's attended a training workshop in Burlington County.

Essex: A new project "zone gardening" has been started in Branch Brook Park. For now, Master Gardeners will assume responsibility of maintaining and enhancing some of the more prominent areas of the park. The project will entail removal of over grown weeds and brush, pruning of existing ornamental planting and eventually replanting with historically accurate planting according to the Olmsted plans.

The cherry tree pruning group in Branch Brook Park has grown to 20 people. We have pruned over 1700 trees to date. We recently moved into the north end of the park where there are approximately 2400 cherry trees.

Our graduation is set for Sept. 21, 2013. We will be hosting a BBQ for the 23 graduates. Our 2013 -2014 class begins Sept. 18th in Roseland. We currently have 12 enrolled.

The Teaching Garden at Presby Memorial Gardens is looking forward to a new 10 foot deer fence being installed this week. It has been a struggle to keep the critters out all summer. We hope to hold a class on planting vegetables for the fall at the end of August for the general public. Next year we plan on holding 10 classes on all aspects of vegetable gardening.

We have been busy manning tables at local tables at local farmers' markets. Our community gardens are brimming with veggies and making donations to local food pantries and soup kitchens. We look forward to getting back to the greenhouse, senior horticulture and school programs.

<u>Gloucester</u>: First, let me say I apologize for our county's "missing in action".

When here last, we were prepping for our annual Master Gardener Plant Sale and what a plant sale it was! Our free lectures were even more popular this year than last. We invited 3 outside vendors and all were very well received and equally impressed with our plant material. It was truly a great day!

We've had meetings and plant swaps. We took a trip to Rutgers Gardens and Rare Find Nursery, where one and all enjoyed the day. Bruce Crawford is always worth spending the day with.

Our yearly graduation luncheon was held on June 5th and there was a record number in attendance .Mary Cummings, the director of our program, was gifted a membership to Longwood Gardens from the group.

Our Junior Master Gardeners wrapped up in June and enjoyed their own treats. The class consisted of 18 children.

Master Gardeners also took a tour of a lavender farm.

July was our big 4H Fair month-with plenty of entries for photos, birdhouse, decorated pots clay and nursery. We had our hands full! There were free craft table activities for all and a well-received insect table with live and expired insects.

We offered a class on proper freezing and canning techniques and canned peaches and made spaghetti sauce. Everyone enjoyed.

We are engaged in a few volunteer projects as well as our own "Clayton Gardens".

Mercer: Our final summer trip in August will be a tour of the bog garden at Rarefied Nursery. After all of our trips, a collection of photos is posted on a secure, password protected website (Smugmug) so that it is available to all MG's.

The next event will be our annual Insect Festival which takes place on Saturday, Sept. 7, at Mercer Educational Gardens. This is always popular, especially with the children. There are games, a puppet show, plenty of microscopes to examine insect specimens, and other organizations such as Rutgers, Mercer County Mosquito Control and a beekeeper. We try to have monarch butterfly hatchings occurring during the festival.

Morris: Master Gardeners served as judges for the horticultural entries at the 4H Fair in Chester in July. Local school children and adults submitted their best harvest from the garden as well as floral arrangements and potted plants.

We also had a MG table at the three day fair. The educational topic this year was "Growing Tomatoes."

As part of our advanced MG training program, we had a refresher class on Soil Testing and interpretation which many MG's attended.

Monmouth: The scheduled summer 8-session Horticultural Enrichment cycle has been completed with the residents of Care One in Holmdel, a rehab facility.

Entrance plantings were completed at the Schroth School in Wanamassa with Cerebral Palsy students who attend school there.

The students are caring for the plants over the summer.

The Lake Como town council invited one of our MG's to provide replanting advice, based upon his research on salt tolerant plants after Superstorm Sandy. We took this research, approved by Diane Larson, and built our Helpline Booth at the recent Monmouth County Fair in the Home and Garden tent around this information. Appropriate plantings adorned our entry way of the booth's man-made dunes. Pamphlets listing various levels of salt tolerant plants were handed out to those who requested then in addition to other Rutgers Fact Sheets.

Also, post Sandy, at the request of Monmouth Beach's Council we submitted plans to recreate planting spaces.
