Planting natives at Overpeck County Park, Teaneck

Class of 2020 students Patricia Brady, left, and Joanna Lin were among the 19 current students aided by members of the Bergen County Environmental Council (BCEC) who planted 400 native plants at Overpeck County Park, Teaneck, during the BCEC fall planting Oct. 25. It was reported that 50 of each of the following woody and herbaceous plants or plugs were planted by volunteers: Cornus racemosa (grey dogwood); Vaccinium angustifolium (lowbush blueberry); Viburnum trilobum (cranberry viburnum); Echinacea purpurea (purple coneflower); Heliopsis helianthoides (false sunflower); Monarda fistulosa (wild bergamot); Panicum virgatum (switchgrass); and Schizachyrium scoparium (little bluestem). According to the BCEC, a total of 10,792 native plants were planted throughout the Bergen County parks system from 2000-2018 thanks to MG students, the BCEC, and other organizations.
