## Free seeds! Garretson Seed Library opens Feb. 25 for the season

Garretson Forge and Farm is excited to host its ninth annual Community Seed Library opening Feb. 25 from 1-3 pm at the farm, 4-02 River Road, Fair Lawn.

All are welcome to stop by and peruse Garretson's collection of open-pollinated, heirloom, and organic seeds, many donated by <u>Seed Savers Exchange</u>, <u>High Mowing Organic Seeds</u>, and <u>Baker Creek</u> <u>Heirloom Seed Co.</u>, along with Garretson Farm's saved seeds. Vegetable, herb, flower, and native seeds are available; stock for individual varieties is limited.

MGs and other gardeners will be available to chat about all aspects of seed propagation and growing as well as organic/sustainable gardening methods.

Garretson Farm established its seed library in 2015 with support from Seed Savers Exchange. The Community Seed Library stocks open-pollinated seeds, which are seeds that produce plants true to the seed they're grown from. Heirloom seeds fall into this category. Open-pollinated seeds are not hybrid seeds or genetically modified seeds.

The mission of Garretson Farm's seed library is to:

Prevent the loss of local seed varieties and the loss of genetic diversity;

The Hermitage needs volunteers to help with the annual maple sugaring event Feb. 17. Rain date is Feb. 18. Volunteers will hand out taps for the trees and help with refreshments. The Hermitage is located at 335 N. Franklin Turnpike, Ho-Ho-Kus.

Meanwhile, volunteers, new and old, are welcome for the spring cleanup, which will begin March 19-20 from 9:30 am-noon.

Plans for the 2024 season are:

- Seed sowing, which will concentrate on annuals (marigolds, herbs, zinnias, broccoli) and mostly perennials (alyssum, salvia, astilbe, coreopsis, evening primrose, coneflower, pinks;
- Repotting plants to sell at the Hermitage's late spring/early summer plant sale;
- Continue to work on deer-proofing a new vegetable garden area; this new bed contains potatoes, garlic, and herbs and eventually will hold grapevines and additional vegetables;
- Plant more perennials throughout the site;
- Create a path in the butterfly garden area;
- Keep weeds under control by laying down mulch and hoeing and removing them; and
- General upkeep of the beds throughout the site.

- Generate and share seed that's adapted to thrive in local soils and climates;
- Offer access to free seed for all, including first time, low-income, and school gardeners;
- Educate the community about how to save seed as well as connect community members to our collective history of seed as a shared resource;
- Strengthen local food systems and increase food security, starting with seed;
- Raise awareness and mobilize action around seed issues such as GMOs and patenting; and
- Create friendships and partnerships.

After Sunday's event, the seed library will be open regularly beginning in late March when Garretson begins its volunteer days and open house days.
