Meet Sereno Danese, Class of 2007

Reno (as most people know him) lives in Tenafly, the town where he was born (at home) and attended high school. As a child he used to watch his father growing

vegetables and his mother propagate flowers from cuttings. He says she could grow anything and had the quintessential green thumb. Gardening was just part of their life. And, his father owned the ubiquitous fig tree, an essential in any Italian's garden, which still produces fruit from suckers 80 years later.

Now Reno and his wife, Michele, live a short drive from Davis Johnson Park where he has been the MG site coordinator for many years. Married for 64 years (they met when they were 15 and 13), they have a close-knit family with son Mark, daughter Ellen, three grandchildren, and five great-grandchildren.

Reno, who is 85 years old, gives all credit to Michele as the wonderful compassionate mother who keeps the family close. Having lost their daughter Kathy at the young age of 34, they are very concerned that all the children be tested for colon cancer, the disease that took her life. "No, you never get over losing a child," he said.

After high school, Reno was drafted, went into the Army Corp of Engineers, from there was accepted into Officer Candidate School, and came out a 2nd lieutenant. Under the GI Bill, he was able to attend Fairleigh Dickenson University in Teaneck. After 9½ years — now with a wife and three children and working full time while going to school — he earned his degree in mechanical engineering. Work for Bendix Corp. took the family to Denver. After that, he went to work on the Apollo rocket project at the Martin Corp. during the beginning years of space research. His claim to fame was meeting Werner Von Braun "for 15 seconds" while working on that project.

Always an active person, he learned to ski, played softball and tennis, and still "plays at golf." Reno is a prostate cancer survivor and attends a support group at Hackensack University Medical Center that he believes gives encouragement to men who were recently diagnosed. He can tell them "Look at me, I'm still alive!"

Having been a volunteer driver for the Red Cross, he and Michele now deliver Meals on Wheels. He is on the Tenafly Green Team, where they are developing a community garden. His church, St. Cecilia in Englewood, has an Office of Concern where Reno is involved with the food pantry. He and Michele have given their children a perfect example of compassion; as a result, their children are following in their parents' footsteps with involvement in the Home Front Project that provides secure living quarters for single mothers and their children.

We can take pride in our fellow Master Gardener Sereno Danese, whose energy and concern for others contributes much to enrich the lives of many.
