Garlic may seep from your pores and give you bad breath, but besides being somewhat of a social hindrance, it's one of the strongest cancer-fighting agents in the natural world. Not only that, garlic has many other incredible properties that have been used by ancient healers to keep the body healthy and heal infections. After you learn about the incredible benefits of this antiviral plant, you may think twice about saying, "hold the garlic." This is a food that adds flavor and only does good things for your body, health, and mind.

Thielke Arboretum

Weed Warrior Day

You're invited to Thielke/Glen Rock Arboretum, 460 Doremus Ave., Glen Rock, on Saturday, Oct. 15 from 9:30 am-noon for the seasonal Weed Warrior Day stewardship project. This time we'll be targeting porcelain berry and privet. Rain date is Saturday, Oct. 22.

Porcelain berry is a highly invasive vine from Asia that looks very much like our native grapevine. Privet is a commonly planted shrub that invades our woodlands, though most nurseries sell it and most landscapers plant it. Learn to ID these plants from their first leaves as a seedling to maturity.

In addition, our expert ecologist from Rutgers, volunteer Jean Epiphan, will be on hand to share her wisdom about these and other invasive plants that may be homesteading on your property, such as Japanese

honeysuckle, Asiatic bittersweet, wisteria, English ivy, myrtle, and amur honeysuckle.

No experience is necessary. We'll train you on site to help restore a healthy balance to our environment. Wear boots, long pants, and long sleeves. Bring gloves, kneelers, pruners, and drinking water.

Annual Bulb Planting

The Thielke/Glen Rock Arboretum will hold its annual bulb planting on Sunday, Oct. 30 from 1:30-3:30 pm. Rain date is Sunday, Nov. 6, same time. This year, you'll not only plant those gorgeous daffodils, but you'll also be introduced to other early-blooming bulbs such as deerand squirrel-resistant glory of the snow (Chionodoxa); striped squill (Pushkinia), those beautiful, easy care, and economical bulbs that are perfect to adorn the feet of the daffodils; and Siberian squill (Scilla), which is actually a bulb-forming herb offering some of the best blues you'll find among the early bloomers.

You'll also learn the nuances of planting. Volunteers of all ages are invited to participate in a variety of tasks, for example, counting the bulbs, digging the holes, and planting the bulbs. Bring your trowel, garden gloves, water, and kneeler.

Fall StoryWalk

The fall StoryWalk book, "Tap the Magic Tree" by Christie Matheson is on display. Christie Matheson is the author of many adult books and magazine articles, but she is best known for her innovative children's books. This beautiful, magical book invites children to help one lonely tree change with the seasons. See the blossoms grow, apples appear, and the leaves swirl away with the autumn breeze. The collage and watercolor art will appeal to children of all ages and their adults.

"Tap the Magic Tree" was selected for the children's enjoyment by members of the Planning Team at the arboretum in collaboration with Sally Morgan, co-owner of the Curious Reader book store, 229 Rock Road, Glen Rock. The hardcover book is available at the Curious Reader in its entire interactive, magical format, which encourages the children to tap, clap, and wiggle and jiggle the pages, no app needed. In addition, Paul Duggan of Mail & More on Rock Road supports the StoryWalk literacy endeavor through the contribution of labor and laminating materials. Both businesses believe in supporting community activities and love to hear the positive StoryWalk comments from their neighbors.

The StoryWalk entrance is indicated by signage at the south end of the Glen Rock pool parking lot, located next

to the arboretum. The StoryWalk is free, but donations are appreciated.

Meet Josie Ko, Class of 2013

If you've ever gone on an MG trip or tour, you know Josie Ko. Josie says she was a "shoo-in" for the trips and

tours chair because she had coordinated visits to the home gardens of her Class of 2013 members. When Risa Marlen, the previous trips and tours chair, moved to Florida in 2014, Josie took over the job.

Josie was born and raised in the Philippines and moved to the United States at age 31. She started working in the U.S. for a sweater company and wound up having a career on the technical side of the garment industry. Prior to retiring in 2012, she was the technical director for production and managed a staff of eight to 10 for Liz Claiborne (where she worked for 13 years) and later for Ralph Lauren. Her career allowed her to travel to locations where clothing production took place such as Hong Kong, China, Peru, and Turkey.

While three generations occupy the Ko home in Park Ridge — Josie, 65; her husband Albert, a retired engineer; daughter Cristy; and grandson Trevor, 17 — she's the only gardener in the family. Her property is on a cul-de-sac and the backyard borders a stream. Over the years, she has completed many a gardening project such as extending and reshaping beds, adding a "meadow" from seed, making an herb garden, creating a gravel walkway, installing a patio near the stream — all with the goal of having color and textural interest on her property in each season.

However, she says she realized "There's more to planting than just going to the nursery and buying what you love." During her local travels, Josie noticed the landscaping of a particular property in Woodcliff Lake. One day, she saw a woman in the garden and stopped to ask if she could take a picture. That woman turned out to be MG Leslie Maltz, who told Josie about the Master Gardener program. When Josie saw a story in the newspaper about an upcoming training session, she enrolled.

In addition to arranging garden tours, Josie volunteers at Skylands for the holiday decorating and at the Hermitage where she sets up teas. She is also a member of the Northeast Beekeepers of New Jersey and has two hives on her property, one of which generated 100 pounds of honey this year. 2016 was a "boom year" for honey, she points out.

Josie says she wishes more people would sign up for the MG tours. "If you're going around the world to see gardens, join us," she says. She points out that she arranges tours of private gardens not generally open to the public. On the recent tour of Sleepy Cat Farm in Connecticut, the group was given a private tour by the owner, saw the guest house, and had the opportunity to ask questions of the landscape architect — features not generally available during a public tour even during the Garden Conservancy's Open Days. Another bonus of the tours: They count toward education hours.
