Chris Rubino from Monrovia will introduce new plants for 2017 and review highlights of 2016. Chris is a native of Buffalo, NY, and a graduate of Cornell University.

His relevant work experience includes retail nursery sales; landscape design, installation, and maintenance; golf course maintenance; research on nutritional deficiencies of vegetable crops; the American Rose Society test garden, Buffalo, NY; Cornell Plantations (now known as Cornell Botanic Gardens); Walt Disney World Co. Epcot Center; Walt Disney Animal Kingdom; Universal's Islands of Adventure; and Monrovia nursery sales in Florida, Georgia, South Carolina, New Jersey, and New York.

He currently travels extensively to domestic and international gardens looking for new and improved plants to introduce to American gardens.

Start preparing the soil in your garden because there's bound to be at least one new plant you must have this year. Chris will also detail the best places to research — both online and in the field — the plants that are being introduced.

# Meet Laura DeFlora, Class of 2011 By Miriam Taub

Laura DeFlora credits her interest in all things "flora" to growing up in Lynchburg, VA. Separating her backyard and that of her maternal

grandparents was a creek bottom. She grew up with the creek, the woods, and the mud, she explained. Summers, she said, were spent on her paternal grandparents' farm in the Spencer's Mountain area of neighboring Amherst County. "Walton country," she called it, referring to the 1970s TV show.

At Old Dominion University in Norfolk, VA, Laura majored in biology with a concentration in botany. It was there she met her future husband, Frank, who was raised in Bergen County. (His family owned Closter's Garden Gate Farms, which closed in the 1960s.) A day after their marriage, they loaded her stuff, including house plants, into a U-Haul headed for an apartment in Lodi.

Laura took a job as assistant manager at Ann Taylor, while Frank worked as a stock broker. Two years later they bought their first home in Glen Rock. On the day they moved in, Laura had their first son Pat, now 30. "New baby, new house," she said. Two years later their second son, George, now 28, was born.

When they needed more room, Laura and Frank embarked on a wild adventure by bidding on a house at a sheriff's sale. The house sat on a builder's acre on the Saddle River in Ridgewood and seemed to have potential although the windows were boarded up so they could not see inside. However, once they were handed the key they found, among other things, that half the kitchen, including the stove, was gone, and the radiators had to be replaced.

They learned from neighbors that the house had been vacant and local kids had used it for parties. "It was a completely depressed property to be tackled one section at a time," Laura recalled. The yard also hadn't been attended to. Several years' worth of leaves needed to be raked and the double row of hemlocks needed attention. "The first thing I did was spray the woolly adelgid," she said.

Ultimately, it was all worth it. With the river, a pool, and the large property, "We were *the* house" to which the neighborhood kids gravitated, she said. "We gave a gift

to our kids that not many people could give. They never came home dry or clean."

However, the house that worked for a couple with two children didn't work for four adults (both sons live at home). In 2015, after 21 years in Ridgewood, the DeFloras downsized to a one-level home in Wyckoff in the Barrister Farms development (formerly the Hilltop Stud Farm property). Their house — known locally as the Hoffman House, Laura says — was the farmhouse that went with the stud farm.

It was when Laura, 59, worked at Ann's Tag Sales in Ridgewood that a friend and coworker, Jo Browning, enrolled in the Master Gardener Class of 2010. Jo promised to work for Laura on Friday mornings (a busy time for tag sales) so Laura could take classes, too. As a result, Laura enrolled in the Class of 2011.

Laura earns most of her volunteer time at the Skylands Holiday Open House and as a consultant for area schools that want to create vegetable, butterfly, or other gardens. "Less physical work, more consulting," she said. She works part-time as a horticultural consultant at Abma's Farm in Wyckoff and is taking classes at the New York Botanical Garden toward a certificate in sustainable landscape design. She's already earned a certificate in plant production. Her goal is to consult with homeowners on how to create a more wildlife-friendly landscape. At home, her garden project for 2017 is to put in an herb garden en route to the front door.

Laura also volunteers at the Depot in Midland Park, an entirely volunteer-run gift shop whose proceeds benefit Children's Aid and Family Services, a non-profit provider of human services and child welfare programs in northern New Jersey.

## **MEDIA REVIEWS**

"Lost Gardens" (2010 DVD: BBC TV, gardening series; eight episodes). Available on YouTube.

Imagine restoring some long-forsaken and almostforgotten British gardens to their once-stately splendor using a team of gardening experts and hundreds of enthusiastic volunteers.

"Lost Gardens" showcases eight garden restorations — Gatton, Shelley Hall, Warwick, Ambleside, Perthshire, Sutton Stop, Chatham, and Penjerrick — with renowned BBC "Gardeners' World" host Monty Don, who leads the main team of Dr. Toby Musgrave, garden historian; Dr. Twigs Way, landscape archeologist; and Ann-Marie Powell, professional landscaper.

The videos feature a diverse collection of deteriorated gardens that have practically vanished. During the fast-paced, five-day restorations each site's former stature, eccentricity, elegance, and appealing charm and glory are restored. Each site is unique and shows the gardening interests and intricacies of its fascinating owners, dedicated caretakers, and numerous admirers both past and present.

The videos convey a deep sense of British societal history and gardening heritage over the past 400 years

as well as the pleasures and nuances of various gardening periods and styles. You will be informed, entertained, and even occasionally surprised when you view this fabulous series.

I really enjoyed watching these videos, which reminded me of the U.S.'s garden conservancy movement, including our own <u>Garden State Gardens</u>. These restorations also gave me a greater appreciation of local efforts to revive and maintain our local historical gardening sites, such as the Hermitage and Garretson Forge and Farm, where I volunteer.
