Meet Susan 'Sue' Sheridan, Class of 2013

Sue Sheridan, an enthusiastic volunteer for the Skylands Manor Holiday Open House, starts thinking about Christmas in June. At a spring garage sale, for example,

she might come face to face with a must-have wreath, garland, or replica of a fox that could be positioned in the Skylands Manor Great Hall for an upcoming holiday season. "That's me, I'm crazy," she said about herself.

Sue Wise grew up in Huntington Bay, Long Island, one of six children. Her first gardening experience was growing vegetables in the family's backyard. After high school, she went to SUNY Oneonta and majored in dietetics. She said she loved the



science of it, that is, the processes by which food is broken down and used by the body and the importance of nutrition in fighting illness, particularly diabetes.

Meanwhile, another Long Islander, Gerard "Jerry" Sheridan, who would become her husband, also attended SUNY Oneonta. "We walked from our graduation to his swearing-in ceremony as a first lieutenant in the Marines," Sue said. The couple initially lived in Quantico, VA, where Jerry continued his training, and later at Camp Lejeune, NC. After 3½ years of military service and with one child in tow, the Sheridans were ready for the next phase of their lives. Sue said

Jerry got three job offers — thanks to the on-base job fairs arranged by the Marines — and he accepted a position at Irving Trust (now Bank of New York Mellon) on Wall Street.

When Sue and Jerry moved back to New York, they lived with her parents, then in Washington Heights where their two daughters were born exactly two years apart. By now, it was time to buy a house. They chose Westwood, Sue said, because they wanted to be close to both sets of parents and the commute to Wall Street, via NJ Transit train, was relatively easy.

Six years later, in 1991, the Sheridans moved to a larger home nearby that was originally owned by Westwood's first mayor, Isaac Bogert. This house, whose backyard abuts the Musquapsink Brook, required major renovation for a family of five. Among other things, Sue said, they enclosed a back porch, built a kitchen/family room in the new indoor space at the rear, and added a deck. Sue said the yard was basically a "blank slate" with its trees and pachysandra. Over the years, she's planted shrubs and, more recently, is replanting with native species to discourage the deer. She finds landscaping almost more interesting than gardening, she added.

While her kids were growing up, Sue was a stay-athome mom and the children's main caregiver. She volunteered as the cheerleading coach, or "moderator," for several years at St. John's Academy in Hillsdale where the girls attended elementary school. As soon as her youngest entered school, she went to work part-time at Midland Bank (now Valley National Bank) as a "mother-teller."

As Sue explained, "It was a very enlightened program allowing mothers to work only the hours their children were in school and to be off whenever they had vacation or were sick at home." She left that job when she and Jerry moved to Hong Kong for Jerry's job with Bank of New York Mellon.

Two years later, when they returned to New Jersey, Sue was rehired by Valley National Bank but this time as a full-timer in customer service and mortgage closings. She retired from the bank in 2012. After a friend went through the MG program, Sue decided, "I'm going to do that," then enrolled in the Class of 2013. One of the best things about the MG program, Sue said, was meeting new people. Initially she volunteered at McFaul and the Hermitage. Two years ago, De Trezza invited her to help with the Holiday Open House and her interest in decorating took off.

In her spare time, Sue, who is 62, knits; she started with clothes for her Barbie doll while in third grade. She

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belongs to a gym, runs, and plays golf. "I'm not good but I enjoy golf," she said. "It's a way to be outside and not be digging." In her basement, she's building a lighthouse from a kit for her grandson, Cole. She also builds glitter or putz houses to incorporate in holiday decorations.

Ten years ago the Sheridans bought a lakeside home in Schroon Lake, NY, where they've vacationed since 1984. The family enjoys their pontoon boat and other lake activities all summer and skiing nearby in the winter. The Sheridan children are Brian, 39, and his wife, Angele, and their two children, Cole and Isabelle; and daughters Bridgid, 35, and Mollie, 33.

Sue has also built decorative, retaining walls in the yards of both her Westwood and Schroon Lake homes. "If a mason can do it, so can I," she asserted, adding that the walls "serve a dual purpose of holding back earth while providing rugged beauty to the gardens/landscaping I continue to develop."

One thing Sue doesn't like to do is cook. "I'm not a good cook," she said, "but everybody managed to grow up healthy and well fed."

Here's how to report your volunteer hours for 2018; no password needed to access the forms

If you've completed your volunteer hours for 2018, you can send in your forms (V&EAR) this month. If you have volunteer commitments for December, be sure to complete your report and send it in January. Do not send partial reports; wait until you have completed your volunteering before sending in a report.

You can report your hours via Excel form or paper, as explained below. The information from the V&EAR is used for our Rutgers Cooperative Extension (RCE) and Rutgers University reports as well as the annual recertification of Master Gardeners. *RCE receives additional funding based on total number of reported volunteer hours.*

Here are the two ways to report your hours:

- Excel form: You can use the form on any PC and email it to me. This is the easiest and most accurate way to track hours. (Do not create your own spreadsheet.)
- 2. Paper form: Paper forms must be mailed, and you need to keep a copy for your records. The mailing address is on the form.

Both the Excel and paper forms can be found on the home page of our <u>website</u> under "Volunteer & Education Reporting Forms." *No password is needed.* If you haven't downloaded the forms recently, be sure to download the current versions. The November 2018 Excel form has the most accurate list of approved sites, which are the only entries that should go under the location column.

Do not use the online volunteer reporting system as it's not ready for 2018 data entry!

When using the Excel form, remember to change the file name from "V&EAR Email Form" and save with your name and year of reporting. Example, Mary Smith 2018. If you need help renaming your form, please ask. Send the entire report as one spreadsheet. Do *not* separate your education and volunteer hours into two or more reports, and do *not* send two or more spreadsheets. Enter only one date per line, especially if you're submitting a paper report. (If I can't read it, I can't enter it.)

Under education hours you can include the following:

- Any MG workshops and lectures at the meetings;
- Lectures, educational courses, conferences, and docent-led tours at almost any venue including, but not limited to, garden clubs, Rutgers, NYBG, NJBG, association meetings, guided tours, seminars, workshops, etc.

Do not include any of the following:

- Travel time, lunch, socializing;
- Tours of other MG gardens, Garden Conservancy open garden tours;
- Online research and reading (online or magazines, books, etc.).

Do you recognize me?

Boneset (*Eupatorium perfoliatum*) has a long history of medicinal use in this country. Victoria Jackson's "*American Eden: David Hosack, botany and medicine in the garden*" tells that Hosack (1756-1836), the physician present at the Hamilton-Burr duel, used boneset as one of his prime medicines. It was also used during the Civil War (recall the presentation by Lesley Parness at the April MG meeting), and it is used today by herbalists to treat a variety of ailments.

No specific chemical component has been identified as reducing fever and pain. There are similar plants called boneset, but apparently only *E. perfoliatum* has medicinal properties. Hosack built the first botanical garden in New York City, currently the site of Rockefeller Center. Hosack could not find the philanthropists that a century later made the current New York Botanical Garden a success.
