Virginia is a Master Composter with more than 30 years of experience in environmental education with a focus on solid waste management, waste reduction, backyard composting, organic gardening, and school

gardens. She is the former recycling coordinator for Monmouth County.

Another fall program will be "Confessions of an Attention-Deficit Gardener" with speaker Robert E. (Bob) Lyons. The subtitle of his program is "an unembarrassed account of using annuals and tender perennials to create brilliant landscapes that change every year.

Meet Noreen Postman, Class of 2016

By Miriam Taub Noreen Postman and her husband, Bill, are responsible for maintaining the landscaping of three properties: Their home in Hasbrouck Heights, the garden behind his law office in a 100-year-old former

bank building on Hasbrouck Heights' Boulevard, and their second home on two acres (one totally wild) near Honesdale, PA. However, at this time, soil is Noreen's enemy. Noreen's immune system is compromised by cancer and she was told, "You do NOT touch dirt."

Noreen McDonough grew up in an apartment in the Greenville section of Jersey City, so her relationship to plants — other than the proverbial philodendron — was limited to the gardens of a few relatives. And they, she recalled, were "of the mind to say 'stay away from my rose bushes.' " Noreen said her first personal encounter with gardening was growing geraniums from seed for a science project at Sacred Heart elementary school.

After high school, Noreen stayed local by majoring in math at St. Peter's College (now St. Peter's University). Her high school teachers advised: When you pick your major, be sure to find a school with a good reputation for that subject. She held a work-study job for four years as a computer programmer, which turned out to be her first career. Noreen met Bill at St. Peter's when they were dismantling a set from a student play. She recalled a mutual friend telling her "There's my friend, Bill. Take him this hammer." They were married in 1974 and moved to Hasbrouck Heights, where he grew up, in 1975.

After college graduation, Noreen got a job at the Securities Industry Automation Corp. (SIAC), a company formed by the New York and American stock exchanges to provide information technology services to the exchanges. She worked on mainframe, microcomputer, and Tandem projects for the NYSE and AMEX trading floors. (Tandem computers were designed to provide scaling and redundancy — a big consideration in that industry.) She later worked at Citibank and JP Morgan.

Of her time at SIAC, she said, "I always had female colleagues, and the logistics required us all to work nights and weekends. My first female manager advised me to not expect special treatment and to dress conservatively." In 1974, she continued, the industry was very new. "I came into a company with a specific purpose and a small population; they were more interested in could I get the work done than in my gender. As an industry grows, things often change."

In 2006, Noreen retired from IT as a result of a downsizing. She earned an online MBA from the University of Phoenix. When a friend mentioned she wanted to attend H&R Block's training to be a tax preparer, Noreen agreed to go, too. Noreen, who is 66, has been a tax preparer at the Lodi H&R Block office for "nine or 10 years" working as a seasonal employee (limited hours after April 15). She also worked in the quality group for the 2010 US Census doing things like training, verifying information, testing potential Census employees, and fingerprinting new employees locally.

Meanwhile, she said she'd "always thought about" the MG training. After her cancer diagnosis in 2014 and the ensuing chemo and radiation treatment, she thought, "What are you waiting for?" During her interview for the MG Class of 2016, Noreen explained to then-horticulture consultant Dail Reid that she couldn't do heavy lifting or start a gas-powered motor due to her cancer treatment. She recalled Dail replying that MGs "don't mow lawns" for their volunteer hours. Noreen has volunteered at Thielke Arboretum, Washington Spring Garden, and the Bergen County Zoo doing pruning, trail maintenance, working in the herb garden, and maintaining the container plants.

Noreen is a founding member of the Hasbrouck Heights Garden Club. In addition to gardening, which is on hold, she enjoys reading murder mysteries by authors such as Rita Mae Brown and Susan Wittig Albert whose character, China Bayles, is an herbalist. Noreen and Bill have been involved with scale miniatures, like dollhouses, and had belonged to a miniatures club and to NAME (National Association of Miniature Enthusiasts). They have two cats, Whitefoot and Blackfoot. Noreen explained the gender-neutral names by saying that she and Bill didn't know both were female until they were taken for their "special operation."

Noreen pointed out some of the overgrown trees on her property by explaining that when they moved in, "One of our problems was not understanding how big things will get." Until such time as she can take to the yard, Noreen will be exploring gardening books.

Volunteers needed at NJBG

The New Jersey Botanical Garden/Skylands is seeking volunteers to help restore the moraine/rock garden. Moraines are deposits of rock left behind by melting glaciers at the end of the last Ice Age. The garden consists primarily of ground-hugging alpines, such as heather, sedums, gentians, dwarf conifers, and many low creeping plants, which thrive on rocky slopes with water seeping beneath.

THIS AND THAT

If you missed the Master Gardener picnic at Van Saun Park in June, you also missed having a piece of Dorothy Penkalski's great Fruit Swirl Coffee Cake. Here's the recipe.

Fruit Swirl Coffee Cake

1½ cups sugar
½ cup butter, softened
½ cup shortening
1½ tsp. baking powder
1 tsp. vanilla
1 tsp. almond extract
4 eggs
3 cups flour
1 can (21 oz.) cherry pie filling

Heat oven to 350 degrees. Generously grease a jelly roll pan, 15¹/₂ x10¹/₂ inches, or two 9-inch square pans. Blend sugar, butter, shortening, baking powder, vanilla, almond extract, and eggs in a large mixer bowl on low speed, scraping bowl constantly. Beat 3 minutes on high speed, scraping bowl occasionally. Stir in flour. Spread 2/3 of the batter on the jelly roll pan (or 1/3 in each 9inch pan). Spread filling over batter. Drop remaining batter by tablespoonsful onto pie filling.

Bake about 45 minutes. While warm, drizzle with glaze, recipe below. Cut cake into squares.

Note: You can use 1 cup of butter if you don't want to use shortening. Also, any flavor of pie filling works well with this cake.

Glaze

Mix 1 cup confectioners sugar and 1 to 2 tablespoons of milk thoroughly; drizzle over cake. You can use almond milk, if you prefer.
