Robert Lyons presents: Confessions of an attention-deficit gardener

An unembarrassed account of using annuals and tender perennials to create brilliant landscapes that change every year

Dr. Robert Lyons knows all too well from personal experience the challenges of living with ADD (or ADHD), such as hyperactivity, attention span, the ability to

concentrate, ease of distraction, and reaching closure. While it may be relatively easy to pinpoint ADD's impact relative to



everyday life, it may come as a surprise that a gardener with ADD may exhibit some very interesting behaviors and preferences related to his or her gardening practices and likes and dislikes.

From a purely light-hearted, observational, and nonscientific perspective, Robert will describe his own gardening habits, plant acquisition philosophy, use of color, and garden maintenance practices resulting from a life-long affair with ADD.

Robert has a BA in biology from Rutgers University and earned a PhD from the University of Minnesota. He served on the faculty of Virginia Tech and North Carolina State University where he taught about herbaceous plants. He is past director of the Longwood Gardens graduate program in public horticulture.

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He's now a retired professor emeritus in landscape horticulture at the University of Delaware. Bob has been an avid photographer for more than 30 years, lecturing nationally on horticultural photography. His work has been published in numerous print and electronic publications.

Meet Tammy Laverty, Class of 2015

Tammy Laverty admitted that in the 1980s she planted her first vegetable garden under a maple tree. She's

learned a lot about gardening since then.



Tammy, 61, a
Ridgefield Park
resident, grew up in an
apartment in North
Bergen as an only child.
("I kind of liked it," she
said.) Tammy added
that she's always liked
flowers, but her real
love is all types of
animals, so today her
garden's main goal is to
attract and support
birds, butterflies, and
insects.

After graduation from North Bergen High School, she got a job at

the Martex sheet company's New York sales office where she remained for 30-odd years.

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She moved among departments — accounting, travel, and capital assets — and weathered multiple takeovers. The travel department was her favorite though. Her office managed the salesmen who worked across the United States. In those pre-Internet days, she recalled, "We actually hand-wrote airline tickets."

Eventually, the takeovers got the better of her and she decided to change careers. Despite a prospective drop in pay, she began the veterinary tech program at Bergen Community College. She loved the idea of working with animals. But the task of drawing blood was not her cup of tea so she decided against completing the training. Meanwhile, Tammy's priority became caring for her mother, Dorothy, who was diagnosed with cancer and had come to live with her. After her mother died, Tammy saw the MG program advertised in the newspaper and she enrolled in the Class of 2015.

While an MG student, Tammy said she followed the standard advice that she should visit all the volunteer sites to get a feel for each one and the work involved. That's when she found her niche at the Butterfly and Native Garden in Overpeck Park. She and Pat Knight are the only MGs to maintain that site along with Don Torino, president of the Bergen Audubon Society.

During this past sweltering summer, Tammy noted that they — along with two students from the Class of 2018 — took turns watering the garden every few days. Her reward was when a hummingbird hovered in front of her face in the spray from the hose. "I felt like a kid for the rest of the day," she said, adding, "This is the kind of thing you can only tell other gardeners."

Unlike the Butterfly and Native Garden, her own backyard is mostly shade. When she and her husband, Robert "Bob" (now deceased), bought the property three decades ago, Tammy pointed out that the backyard was "grass only" with a detached garage that "came down in a yank." They replaced that garage with a smaller one and, over time, pulled out the grass and planted native trees and shrubs such as wild hydrangea. "They're not as pretty as other hydrangeas, but the pollinators love them," she explained.

Since her yard is too shady to raise vegetables, Tammy has a plot in the Ridgefield Park community garden where she grows Swiss chard, radishes, dill, tomatoes, and zinnias. And though she doesn't eat tomatoes, her coworkers at the Ridgefield Park Public Library are happy to have them. Tammy has been working part-time at the library for "four or five years," mostly at the circulation desk.

Tammy explained that she's notoriously not good at keeping track of time. "When my husband would ask

what time we were going somewhere, I'd say '3-ish,' " she said by way of example. Bob gave her a watch that had "ish" printed after each number on its dial.

Tammy's other interests include everything arts and crafts. She and her mother used to create Christmas ornaments for the family. Now Tammy paints with watercolors and does printmaking and ceramics. "I enjoy the process of working with clay and colors even if it doesn't come out the way I want," she said. She's currently taking a beading course. Tammy also is a member of the Bergen County Audubon Society and participates in Project Feeder Watch by periodically counting and reporting the number of birds that visit the pole feeder attached to her deck.

In addition to her rescue dog, Molly, who is partially blind, Tammy is raising a handful of black swallowtail caterpillars (courtesy of MG Sharon Ma) that will spend the winter in her garage.

Do you recognize me?

Karen Riede identified this plant as pilewort (aka American burnweed or Erechtites hieracifolia). It's a member of the aster family and has yellow flowers that look as if they're in a tube and seeds with a tuft of white hairs for wind distribution. The seed heads are more attractive than the flowers. The plants may grow to 8 feet tall and are most often seen in weedy sites. They should remain abundant until our first frost.

Veterans Home special project

With a new year came new inspirations. It started with a personal need to honor those who've served our country. Dennis Gretchen and I went online to see who was in charge of volunteers at the New Jersey Veterans Home, Paramus, and to offer gardening services. We were put in touch with Susan Moran, supervisor of volunteers, and Anthony Elia, supervisor of recreation. Both Susan and Anthony were very enthusiastic about the idea. A meeting was set up in late January to discuss possibilities. Our MG of BC Board voted to approve the special project and to support it going forward.

Dennis and I developed a site plan and budget, which was approved by the Veterans Home CEO and Board of Trustees. While the program "officially" began in March, the extensive March/April snowfall delayed the

groundbreaking. However, this allowed for trips to purchase gardening tools, pots, and sensory-stimulating items, such as wind chimes and flags. As the weather warmed, herbs and early flowering plants were planted in raised beds built and donated by the organization Jersey Cares. These beds have been replanted according to the changing seasons. To date, several garden "rooms" have been developed, including a 9/11 memorial garden and a butterfly/pollinator garden. Plans include a water feature, perennial grasses by the gazebo, and a fern display in the shade of the many old established trees.

In return for their efforts, our MG volunteers have a sense of fulfillment as we see the happiness the vets experience as they "escape" into their garden. Dennis and I are building friendships both with staff and our veterans during our weekly volunteering.

As a complete surprise and honor, the Veterans Home staff arranged a ribbon-cutting ceremony and blessing for the garden and presented a beautiful plaque to Dennis and me as a thank you for bringing this touch of nature for our vets to enjoy.
