Meet Arta Pagano, Class of 2016

As if working in her own yard in Tenafly and volunteering at the Hermitage and
Garretson Forge and Farm isn't enough, Arta Pagano works two plots in her local community garden (lots of milkweed and tomatoes) and digs and plants in the garden of an 85-year-old friend in Ho-Ho-Kus.

Arta started working at the Hermitage with other MG student in her class and is now in charge of the World War II victory garden. She volunteers at the Hermitage Tuesdays or Wednesdays, or both. She produced a map of that garden, which contains World War II-era vegetables like tomatoes radishes, rutabaga, peas, Swiss chard, kohlrabi, beets, turnips, lettuce, and broccoli rabe. Broccoli rabe? She chuckled as she explained that the broccoli rabe, which seemed out of its time element, didn't do very well in the victory garden.

Arta credited Monica Buesser (MG Class of 2013 who has since relocated to Connecticut) with motivating her and making her feel welcome at the Hermitage. Monica would contact volunteers in advance and notify them what was planned for the workday, Arta explained. The agenda often required physical labor, such as unearthing bricks that hadn't seen the light of day in a century and using them to mark the boundaries of the kitchen garden.

Another heavy lifting chore: Collecting and boiling sap to make maple syrup that the Hermitage gives away. Nevertheless, Arta said of the Hermitage, "The grounds are magical, and the old house has such a good vibe to it." She added: "You're getting your hands dirty with likeminded people."

On Thursdays she's at Garretson, where the volunteers work from 10 to 2 and break for lunch under a shade tree, often sharing fresh-picked fruits or vegetables from the farm.

Arta, 65, grew up an only child in Englewood, CO. She had cousins who lived on a farm in eastern Colorado whom her family would visit, usually in the spring and summer. The adults were full-time farmers who'd put in long hours, gather for a hearty lunch, and return to the tractors and fields for an afternoon of back-breaking work. Seeing this true farm-to-table lifestyle — and learning to milk a cow — seeded Arta's interest in gardening. After graduating from high school in 1970, she obtained a BS degree in child development from Colorado State University in Fort Collins. Then she was off to Boulder where she taught preschool.

After four years, Arta looked skyward for a career change. She became a flight attendant for TWA where she was based in Chicago, then St. Louis, and "finally an opportunity to transfer to New York." It was there that a mutual friend introduced her to Frank Pagano, a professional drummer who grew up in Glen Rock. They have been married for 31 years and have a son, James, a sound engineer who's currently living at home. Before moving to Tenafly 23 years ago, they lived in Englewood Cliffs and then Englewood.

Meanwhile, the airline industry was changing. After TWA's three bankruptcies and its sale to American Airlines in 2001, Arta and fellow TWA employees were furloughed. One consolation: A lifetime American Airlines pass to fly free on standby. Her many destinations include Paris; Germany; Austria; Italy; Taos and Santa Fe, NM; Colorado; and St. Martin in the Caribbean. She was back to teaching preschool (Leonia) and later worked in a day care center in Upper Saddle River until funding disappeared.

Eventually, Arta said, she saw the "calling all gardeners kind of thing" in the newspaper, and she enrolled in the MG Class of 2016. As she explained, "I have three passions. I love to fly, I love to garden, and I love children."

Earlier this summer, her yard became a Certified Wildlife Garden through the Bergen County Audubon Society. She has four raised beds on the property – three containing vegetables and one for pollinators. All are surrounded by wire fencing to keep out the deer.

Arta is also a member of the Tenafly Garden Club. Her other activities include repurposing lumber as a canvas for painting nature scenes. In fact, her wildlife garden certificate is displayed on a salvaged plank from the Hermitage. Last year she used her canning equipment to pickle watermelon rind. And maybe one day, she said, she'll return to Denver to get a degree in hort therapy.

"I've got lots of energy," Arta said. "Being a flight attendant, I never sat down. I like to be busy."
