How to report your volunteer hours for 2019; no password needed to access the forms

If you've completed your volunteer hours for 2019, you can send your report (V&EAR) this month. If you have volunteer commitments for December, be sure to complete your report and send it in January. Do not send partial reports; wait until you've completed your volunteering before sending in a report.

You can report your hours via Excel form or paper, as explained below. The information from the V&EAR is used for our Rutgers Cooperative Extension (RCE) and Rutgers University reports as well as the annual recertification of Master Gardeners. RCE receives additional funding based on total number of reported volunteer hours.

Here are the two ways to report your hours:

- **1. Excel form:** You can use the form on any PC and email it to me. This is the easiest and most accurate way to track hours. (Do not create your own spreadsheet.)
- **2. Paper form:** Paper forms must be mailed, and you need to keep a copy for your records. The mailing address is on the form.

Both the Excel and paper forms can be found on the home page of our <u>website</u> under "Volunteer Reporting." *No password is needed.* If you haven't downloaded the forms recently, be sure to download the current versions. The November 2018 Excel form has the most accurate list of approved sites, which are the only entries that should go under the location column.

Do not use the online volunteer reporting system as it's not ready for 2019 data entry!

When using the Excel form, remember to change the file name from "V&EAR Email Form" and save with your name and year of reporting. Example, Mary Smith 2019. If you need help renaming your form, please ask. Send the entire report as one spreadsheet. Do *not* separate your education and volunteer hours into two or more reports, and do *not* send two or more spreadsheets. Enter only one date per line, especially if you're submitting a paper report. (If I can't read it, I can't enter it.)

Under education hours you can include the following:

- Any MG workshops and lectures at the meetings;
- Lectures, educational courses, conferences, and docent-led tours at almost any venue including, but not limited to, garden clubs, Rutgers, NYBG, NJBG, association meetings, guided tours, seminars, workshops, etc.

Do not include any of the following:

- Travel time, lunch, socializing;
- Tours of other MG gardens and Garden Conservancy open garden tours;
- Online research and reading (online or magazines, books, etc.).

MG of BC volunteer sites open during the winter

If you enjoy the great outdoors during the cold weather and want to earn volunteer hours the following sites are open and available to you. Check with the site coordinators for more information.

Bergen New Bridge Medical Center, 230 E. Ridgewood Ave., Paramus

Various days and times; a background check and tuberculin test are required to work at this site. Site coordinator: Lynette Stewart

Winter activities: Help maintain greenhouse by watering plants, removing dead foliage, checking for insect infestation, and treating plants when necessary. Propagate plants and flowers for annual plant sales at Christmas, Valentine's Day, and Mother's Day. Create floral arrangements and planters and assist with sales. You may help the horticultural therapist oversee the residents as they plant seeds and transplant cuttings.

The Hermitage, 335 N. Franklin Turnpike, Ho-Ho-Kus Tuesdays and Wednesdays, 9:30 am-noon, weather permitting; other days/times for specific activities. Site coordinator: Kathleen Sullivan

Winter activities: Choose and plant vegetable seeds; plan May plant sale; trim trees; train and run maple sugaring event; collect sap and prepare maple syrup.

Note: Free tour of the museum at 10 am Dec. 4 for MGs who volunteered in 2019; contact <u>Lynn Curtin</u> to register.

Thielke Arboretum, 460 Doremus Ave., Glen Rock Stewards, docents, and ambassadors needed year-round. Stewardship hours: Tuesday and Saturday, 9 amnoon, weather permitting. Site coordinator: Herb Arbeiter

Winter activities for stewards: Prune, trail work, organize supplies and tools; late winter plantings; install deer protection and maintain existing deer protection; winter sowing; collect and organize botanical specimens. Note: Park in the pool parking lot. Come prepared to work outdoors; dress in layers; insulated waterproof boots are best.

Below is information about another new pest - Beech Leaf Disease. Reprinted from Branching Out, an integrated pest management newsletter for trees and shrubs published by Cornell University. Beech Leaf Disease reported in Westchester County

Beech Leaf Disease is so new a pest that the name may change as research reveals more information about this newest threat to this important and valued tree species. The disease has been observed to affect American beech (*Fagus grandifolia*), European beech (*Fagus sylvatica*), and oriental beech (*Fagus orientalis*).

It causes striking darkening of green interveinal tissue on beech leaves. Affected leaves may also become necrotic, stunted, leathery, distorted, and crinkled. Dead beech buds have also been observed, and beeches may show thinning of the leaf canopy as affected leaves are eventually lost.

Beech Leaf Disease has been confirmed in several places in Westchester County, most recently on American beeches in Greenburgh and White Plains. Other New York state, Connecticut, Pennsylvania, and Ontario, Canada, locations have been documented including the first sightings of the disease, seven years ago, in northeastern Ohio.
