Several conferences of interest to Master Gardeners have been scheduled in the next few months. Here's a preview so you can mark your calendar.

Tick training at Rutgers

Start your summer with a one-day training program titled "Ticks and insects of interest" sponsored by Rutgers Cooperative Extension and the Rutgers Department of Agriculture and Natural Resources. The training will be from 9 am-3 pm Wednesday, June 19 at the Rutgers University Busch Campus Student Center, 604 Bartholomew Road, Piscataway.

Training is free, but you must register online in advance as well as register your vehicle so

you can park on campus. Enrollment is limited to 112 participants. Earn 4 Rutgers MG CEUs for attending.

Topics to be discussed are East Asian longhorn tick discovery; disease vectors in NJ: ID and biology; tickborne disease prevention for humans; and ticks and animals. The training is intended for MGs, MG coordinators, and RCE staff and faculty. Among the speakers are Dina Fonseca, PhD, director, Rutgers Center for Vector Biology.

A word or two about our Award for Excellence winners

Donna Faustini

Following a long career in nursing, working in hospitals, clinics, post op, intensive care, and finally school nursing, Donna retired and decided to pursue an all-time passion for gardening. She recalled that both sets of grandparents were gardeners; her maternal grandparents had a farm in Carrollton, PA, where she spent summer vacations. She recalled her time there as "especially vivid... full of petunias, meadows,

vegetables, and the cows, sheep, chickens, cats, and dogs."

Donna has volunteered in the state greenhouse at Skylands. "It was quite an experience watching everything grow from tiny seeds to flourishing plants and readying them for their outside adventure," she said. She also volunteers at Bergen New Bridge Medical Center where she helps coordinate the center's plant sales and makes floral arrangements and baskets, the proceeds of which go toward programs for the residents.

She also assists at the VA Home in Paramus, the special project started last year by Carolyn and Dennis Gretchen. "We do some horticultural therapy and handson projects. We had the residents do some winter container gardening and what a yield we had," she reported.

Currently, Donna arranges the programs for our monthly MG meetings, and she's always looking for new speakers, new ideas, and current trends. And, she said, though it's a fun job it's sometimes challenging, too. Donna helps with the garden club tea held at 1 Bergen County Plaza every other year for local garden clubs to share information about speakers.

Donna and her husband, Richard, who owns Faustini's Institute of Martial Arts and Fitness in Emerson, have four grown daughters. "We're all black belts," she reported. Donna has lived in Montvale for 34 years, which was "full of farms back then," she noted. "Things have changed. All the farms are just about gone. Deer and coyotes have moved in, so gardening has changed, too. I am up for that challenge with deer spray in hand," she said.

Miriam Taub

Miriam is the organization's corresponding secretary, garden club liaison, and co-editor of the *Potting Shed*, and, over the past three years, she has interviewed several dozen MGs for what she calls the "MG of the month" column.

Miriam was inspired to enroll in the Class of 2011 when volunteering at the Teaneck Creek Conservancy where several MGs were earning their volunteer hours and they spoke to her about the program. She admitted to some hereditary influence, too. Her late father, Irving Taub, spent many years as a florist starting as a teen, and was a wizard with houseplants. Once, she said, he found a sad-looking spilt leaf philodendron on a sidewalk in New York awaiting a sanitation pickup. "He brought it home on the bus, nursed it back to health, and it spent many happy years in our living room," she recalled.

However, "I did not get the houseplant gene, and many an indoor plant has died on my watch," she added.

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Instead, Miriam prefers outdoor gardening. Over the years — with occasional help from landscaper Arnie Friedman — they have changed the front and back yards of her Teaneck home. As with many gardens, she referred to her yard as a work in progress. Last year's project was the installation of a "meadow" in her side yard.

Miriam, who's retired, had volunteered exclusively at the Teaneck Creek Conservancy. In the fall of 2015, Miriam found her way to Janet Schulz to complain that a change she wasn't happy with was made to an article she'd written for the *Potting Shed*. Janet's solution was for Miriam to volunteer to edit the newsletter. It was a good fit since Miriam spent the first part of her career in the daily newspaper business followed by managing the writing and distribution of human resources-related communications for Citigroup.

Creating a succession of bloom in the native garden

To attract and support pollinators, a succession of bloom is a must in any landscape. From early spring through late fall, different species of pollinators look for different types of plants at different times. And, some plants are much more useful to pollinators than others.

Kim Eierman, environmental horticulturist, will explain what you need to know to make your garden beautiful and ecologically supportive throughout the growing season with great choices of native plants. Kim specializes in ecological landscapes and native plants and teaches at the New York Botanical Garden, Brooklyn Botanic Garden, and other locations around the metropolitan area.
