Lesley Parness Beyond the Potted Palm: Victorians and Their Houseplants



The Victorian Era was also England's golden age of plant exploration. It was a time, said Lesley Parness, a garden historian and writer, when the public's growing interest in natural history and obsession with "collecting" came together around plants.

The variety of houseplants available for purchase burgeoned during Queen Victoria's reign. Ever after, Brits and Americans have been in love with them. Lesley said that not only can houseplants complement and enhance any room's decor, but also NASA studies confirm their ability to remove indoor air pollution. Leslie will discuss the plants that populated Victorian parlors, how to care for them, and simple ways to bring a Victorian touch to plant-scaping your home.

Lesley has worked in public gardens in the United States and abroad for four decades. In 2017, she retired as superintendent of horticultural education for the Morris County Park Commission where she oversaw programming and interpretation at the Frelinghuysen Arboretum, Willowwood Arboretum, and Bamboo Brook Outdoor Education Center.

She is a founding member and past president of <u>Garden</u> <u>State Gardens</u>, a non-profit consortium of New Jersey's public gardens. According to her <u>website</u>, currently she's "enjoying my own garden and spending time with likeminded plant people." She last spoke to the MG of BC in April 2018 on the topic of medicinal plants of the Civil War.

Garden Club of Teaneck volunteers create 'gem' of a pollinator garden

A new pollinator garden near the Garden Club of Teaneck's (GCT) greenhouse invites bees, butterflies, and birds to rest awhile at the end of Lindbergh Boulevard.

This 26-x-37-foot hidden gem is located amid two community gardens, the greenhouse, and the township's garden debris recycling area. The area was originally planted with crape myrtle, holly, spirea, and boxwood. In recent years, the area had become overgrown with weeds and invasive vines.

GCT volunteers spent many hours this spring weeding, clearing, mulching, and preparing the land. Once ready, volunteers planted native species of plants known to attract a variety of pollinators. The plantings loosely followed a design done by <u>S&K Wildflower Rescue and Nursery</u>. This newly created pollinator garden is a work in progress. We hope to clear and plant additional areas surrounding the garden in the coming years.

The GCT received a grant from the Bergen County Audubon Society (BCAS) that covered some costs including those of an educational sign and native plants. The pollinator garden has been certified by BCAS as a <u>Certified Wildlife Garden</u>.

If you love nature and wildlife, please visit our garden. Enter under the arbor newly planted with Lonicera sempervirens, a native species of honeysuckle with red trumpet flowers that hummingbirds love. Walk the short stone path, enjoy the flowers in bloom, read about pollinators, sit awhile on the bench, and catch sight of the monarchs and hummingbirds feeding on the flowers. The pollinator garden is open to the public. From the GCT's greenhouse parking area (at the end of Lindbergh Boulevard) look for the garden behind the tall grasses that curve around the parking area. Janet Schulz, Class of 1988, reports that while she cuts her Lespedeza (above) down to the ground each fall, it's a fast grower and gets to be about 10 feet tall. It required a Sawzall when she wanted to share a "cutting" with a friend. But is it invasive?

Comment from Bruce Crawford, manager of horticulture, Morris County Park Commission:

"Lespedeza thunbergii has never yielded seedlings in the many years that I have grown it. It's a great plant to place atop a wall or on a bank where it can drape down. We planted 30 or so along Ryders Lane at the entrance to the [Rutgers] Gardens several years back. It proved to be very salt-tolerant and no seedlings. It did not like to have its crown covered with woodchips. The plant [in the photo] looks like the cultivar 'Gibraltar' and I see no reason why this plant would not make a fine addition to your garden."
