

Dr. Charlie West Pawpaws and American Persimmons: Underutilized Native North American Fruit Trees

I'm glad to see so many entries on Better Impact; we have some very busy volunteers.

For those who have not yet entered hours this year, just a reminder that it is much easier to enter your hours as you go so you do not have to go back in your calendars to recall what days you volunteered. That goes for your continuing education (CE) hours, too.

Once again let me emphasize that you MUST record your hours to maintain your MG certification each year. Certification enables you to be a voting member of our organization, allows you to chair one of many committees, or sign up as a volunteer coordinator for one of our sites and, ultimately, become part of our board if you desire to be more involved with our organization.

We are required to record a minimum of 25 hours at our volunteer sites and a minimum of 10 CE hours annually. CE hours do not count as volunteer hours and vice versa.
